

DISTRIBUTION OF IUB STUDENTS ABROAD BY SCHOOL, 2019-20









PARTICIPATION RATES BY IUB SCHOOL, 2020-21 (20% and up)



TOP PARTICIPATION RATES BY COLLEGE DEPARTMENT, 2020-21 GRADUATES




DURATION ABROAD, IUB STUDENTS, 2019-20

GENDER & MINORITY DATA


IU continues to have a higher percentage of males studying abroad than the national average.

The percentage of minorities studying abroad from IUB in 2019-20 was 20%, and is drawing closer to the campus distribution among minority groups.









OVERSEAS STUDY MINORITY ENROLLMENT VS. IUB CAMPUS PROFILE, 2019-20*







TOP TEN IU STUDY ABROAD DESTINATIONS







PROGRAMS: CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC

The ongoing coronavirus pandemic that began in January 2020 had a major impact on all study abroad programs worldwide, including those organized through Indiana University in both 2019-20 and in 2020-21.

2019-20

Spring 2020:

When the pandemic began in 2020, 1,353 IU students were abroad across 37 countries. Between late February and late March, the majority of IU students returned home and program organizers and institutions arranged for students to complete their courses remotely. All spring break programs were also cancelled, affecting an additional 700+ IU students.

Summer 2020:

All 2020 summer programs were suspended, impacting 2,000 IU students.

2020-21

Fall 2020:

The subsequent suspension of fall 2020 programs involved another 200+ IU students who had applied for their programs before the pandemic hit.


Spring 2021:

For the spring of 2021, IU officials gave permission for a reduced set of semester programs to go forward. Since this was before vaccinations were available, only 36 students out of 284 acceptees followed through (out of 870 applicants), studying in 12 cities in 10 countries. The students who traveled abroad followed strict virus mitigation protocols and most studied in a hybrid environment. Some were even delayed months prior to joining their cohort abroad due to unexpected travel restrictions. All spring break programs were suspended.

Summer 2021:

During the summer of 2021, 133 IU students ventured abroad (out of 898 applicants), including 48 who participated in a few faculty-led programs, three through IU South Bend—in Belize, Costa Rica and Iceland-- and one through IU Bloomington to the Dominican Republic. One IUPUI student participated in an internship at a Germany university.

The staff of the Office of Overseas Study worked remotely for 17 months, from March 25, 2020, up through August 4, 2021, managing all communications and meetings electronically. Since the trajectory of the pandemic was not predictable, the staff went through normal processes for each term--recruitment, applications, acceptances, predeparture, advising and orientation for every individual student in each cohort throughout 2020 and 2021, only to have subsequent suspensions or withdrawals undo the majority of those efforts. During this period of remote work the advising staff successfully migrated to a completely paperless transcript process which was an important milestone for the office.





NEW PROPOSALS

The pandemic also saw a decrease, for the second year in a row, in the number of new proposal submissions for future programs. There were only 16 new proposals for credit-bearing programs in 12 countries in 2020-21. The majority were department or school-based with oversight from the Overseas Study Advisory Council and assistance from Overseas Study.

Among the new credit-bearing activities developed:

7 in Europe (Finland, Germany, Portugal, and Spain)

3 in Latin America and the Caribbean (Guyana and Mexico)

3 in Africa and the Middle East (Ghana, South Africa and Israel)

2 in Asia (Japan and South Korea)

1 in multiple countries (Germany and Italy).

System-wide program development grants were not available in 2020-21 due to the ongoing international travel restrictions affecting IU faculty and staff who were only able to travel through special permission from an OVPIA faculty committee.

SCHOOLS & CAMPUSES

In 2020-21 Overseas Study staff convened the IUB Study Abroad Working Group twice through Zoom to discuss common challenges, best practices and compliance requirements. The group is comprised of representatives from all IUB units that manage programs abroad. The group has expanded each year as additional units offer their own study abroad programs. Overseas Study also convened the annual meeting through Zoom of the Campus Coordinators from all IU campuses. For obvious reasons, the dominant topic at all these meetings regarding programming in 2020-21 was less about new initiatives and more about program suspensions due to the coronavirus pandemic and when programming could begin again.

OVERSEAS STUDY ADVISORY COUNCIL ACTIVITIES

In 2020-21 the Overseas Study Advisory Council (OSAC) in conjunction with Overseas Study evaluated proposals that created 18 educational activities, 16 of which were credit-bearing. OSAC met twice through Zoom in 2020-21.

The main focus of the Office of Overseas Study's monitoring of world-wide occurrences in 2020-21 continued to center on the impact of the pandemic on IU students. Overseas Study kept OSAC's Committee on Safety and Responsibility and the upper administration informed every step of the way. Since the Department of State's Travel Advisory system categorized every country in the world at the highest levels—Levels Three and Four—which would have normally resulted in the suspension of programs, Indiana University officials developed a new vetting process throughout the pandemic to evaluate program sites. Members of IU's Medical Response Team, a subset of the University's Restart Committee, worked closely with the Vice President for International Affairs and the Office of Overseas Study to determine which

programs abroad had sufficient virus mitigation strategies to allow IU student participation.

Given the cancellation of most 2020-21 faculty-led programs, there were no safety and responsibility workshops for faculty leaders. However, Overseas Study continued to collaborate with Public Safety and IU units to comply with the Department of Education's Clery Act, which requires reporting on crime incidents abroad when IU controls the location of the program. Overseas Study also monitored activities to ensure the Programs Involving Children complied with reporting requirements and arranged for background checks for all participants.

OSAC's Review Committee ensures that all IU programs are monitored through required reports, evaluations, or site visits as mandated by OSAC policies. Overseas Study monitors the documentation, summarizes them, communicates with program leaders regarding the outcomes and reauthorizes programs when all is deemed satisfactory.

ADDITIONAL OPTIONS THROUGH NON-IU PROGRAMS AND THIRD PARTY PROVIDERS

IU students can also access programs offered through other institutions and organizations if those are suitable to their academic and economic situations. However, the pandemic resulted in the return of students from non-IU programs in the spring of 2020 and the suspension of enrollments for summer 2020, fall 2020 and spring 2021 programs as well. Some 2021 spring and co-sponsored summer programs were approved to move forward.

For students who select these programs, Overseas Study helps vet choices, tracks student participation and maintains relationships with study abroad providers and institutions. Although there were no visitors from providers or partner institutions while Overseas Study staff worked remotely in 2020-21, staff kept in close touch with colleagues through Zoom meetings. Given the pandemic, close communications with our provider partners and the students was essential.



INTEGRATION OF EDUCATION ABROAD INTO DEGREE REQUIREMENTS

Overseas Study continues to participate in committee work regarding the IUB Common Curriculum through which IUB students can count a six-week, six-credit program abroad as fulfillment of the World Languages and Cultures requirement (or a combination of two three-week, three-credit programs).

Through an agreement among the Offices of the Vice President for Undergraduate Education, Overseas Study and the College of Arts and Sciences, Overseas Study provides data to OVPUE on students who have completed programs abroad that fall within the parameters established by the General Education Committee. And Overseas Study continues to work with The College and OVPUE to ensure that appropriate courses taken abroad may count towards other areas within the requirements. Given the suspension of semester-long spring programs due to the pandemic, OVPUE was flexible in evaluating time abroad in order to allow students to complete these requirements, despite the shortened programs.

ADVISING OUTREACH TO SCHOOLS, DEPARTMENTS & CAMPUSES

The staff of Overseas Study engages in outreach to various constituencies and continued to do so throughout the pandemic. Advisors...

- sent two electronic newsletters to campus advisors and study abroad campus coordinators.
- informed campus stakeholders the participation rate in study abroad for their graduated seniors.
- hosted virtual Academic Advisor update session.
- offered 475 drop-in visits through Zoom throughout the 17 months of remote work and returned to in-person visits in August 2021.
- reached 967 students through Zoom presentations organized by various IU units, including admissions, new student orientation, scholarship/funding study abroad, departmental-specific, and diversity outreach.
- reached 304 students in person in August 2021 when Overseas Study advisors resumed outreach on campus.
- created a special video as part of IUB's Chemistry Interview Series.
- continued to utilize faculty expertise to screen dossiers, direct programs or provide instruction.
- · contributed articles to various campus publications.
- conducted discipline-specific information meetings to reach a wider range of majors.
- collaborated with diversity offices to enhance programming (i.e., "Supporting Students of Color in Seoul" and Minority Student Scholarship support).
- launched new national scholarship support resources (i.e., Gilman Scholarship Canvas tutorials and follow-up support sessions and Boren Scholarship campus review sessions).

INTERNSHIPS, SERVICE & RESEARCH PROGRAMS

Internships

40% of IUPUI students abroad were enrolled in credit-bearing internships or service experiences, many at the graduate level, while only 7% of IUB students abroad participated in credit-bearing internships or service experiences in 2019-20. Given the suspension of summer 2020 programs, participation dropped precipitously from previous years.

Overseas Study advisors do targeted outreach regarding internship options abroad and are in regular communication with IU career service offices. One of the new programs proposed in 2020-21 was for a graduate-level internship through O'Neill SPEA in Portugal. The IUB School of Education introduced two new student teacher placement opportunities, one in Ghana and one in Germany.

Service

IUB: A new service program approved is offered through IU Student Activities, IUB Global Dental Brigades in Greece. However, this program as well as other continuing service programs across IUB units were not operational in 2019-20 or 2020-21 due to the pandemic.

Conferences and Research: A few IU graduate students traveled abroad for conferences or research opportunities with special permission from OVPIA during 2020-21.

Performances

Unfortunately, the pandemic prevented IU music students from giving musical performances abroad.

OUTCOMES ASSESSMENT

Overseas Study regularly encourages and promotes outcomes assessment of students abroad. The most recent project was a partnership with the Wells Scholars Program in 2019 to survey their alumni on their study abroad experiences going back over 25 years, given the program's generous support for those activities. They had a 20% response rate. 90% of respondents indicated that it was their most important, or a very important, aspect of their IU college experienced. Results of the survey revealed that the top three reasons for study abroad were personal growth (26%), the travel opportunities (20%) and encouragement from the Wells Program (19%). 85% said it influenced their career; 65% were interested in working for a multinational organization; 81% were interested in working in a foreign country and 46% went on to graduate school. As far as their program experiences, 40% lived in student residences, 29% in apartments and 27% lived with families. In those arrangements, 38% had U.S. roommates, 38% lived with host country nationals and 24% roomed with other international students. They used the host country language across various daily activities—everyday life, class, traveling, housing or with friends.

Periodic data analyses of Wells Scholars study abroad activities have shown that an average of 80% of Wells Scholars have taken advantage of study abroad opportunities which is more than double the percentage of other undergraduates at IUB. Recent cohorts now also have an introductory international seminar for all scholars during their first year although the pandemic interrupted those seminars for the past two years. Wells Scholars have studied abroad for longer periods of time than other IUB study abroad participants—taking more advantage of academic year programs although the trend is towards semester programs and summer programs. Given the deep interest of Wells Scholars in accessing international experiences, the Office of Overseas Study collaborates closely with the program to meet the needs of each individual student.

lowering financial barriers

IU continues to be a leader for its flexible financial aid policies for students going abroad. However, due to the cancellation of spring break and summer programs in 2020-21, IUB students abroad received close to a million dollars in gift aid and loans through IU and federal and state sources. \$540K in gift aid dedicated just for study abroad activities comprised 59% of financial aid used by students. Students also received \$253K in other portable gift aid \$117K in loans.

78% of the students had some form of financial assistance applied towards their study abroad program (not including school-based programs, which utilized various approaches to grants and discounts). The total financial aid amount also included c. \$19K for 5 students from the other IU campuses who participated in system-wide programs.

PRESIDENTAL MATCH SCHOLARSHIPS

President McRobbie's promise to match \$20 million in study abroad endowments reached its goal in 2020, with all IU campuses involved. In 2020-21 awards were made to 48 students for a total of \$92K, a decrease over the previous year due to program cancellations.

HUTTON GRANTS

Overseas Study collaborates with the Hutton Honors College to promote the availability of the Hutton International Experience Program Grants as well as special named scholarships to students applying to study abroad. In 2020-21 these went to fewer students than usual due to the pandemic. However, they were still able to support 32 students for a total of \$99K. Since non-credit service and internships abroad program were suspended in 2021, those types of programs couldn't be funded as in the past.


SCHOLARSHIPS THROUGHOUT IU CAMPUSES

Due to the cancellation of spring break and most summer programs on all IU campuses, Overseas Study distributed less funding for the Short Term Study Abroad Scholarships for students from the regional campuses (IUE, IUK, IUN, IUS, and IUSB). The few students who went abroad through IUSB received this scholarship and Presidential Match scholarships. Of course, all IU campuses will continue to offer special funding for students going abroad on their unit-based programs once such activities resume.

MINORITY SCHOLARSHIPS

IUB minority students abroad are 20.3% of the total as compared to the 25% of the campus minority population. Overseas Study works with diversity offices to convey that study abroad opportunities are available to all qualified students and that there is funding available for them.

The Office of Diversity, Equity and Multicultural Affairs gave almost \$56K in grant funding in 2020-21 to 17 students going abroad at an average of \$3,200 each.

UNIT SUPPORT

IUB schools typically support study abroad through special scholarships but the cancellation of their spring break and summer programs in 2020-21 resulted in less financial support than in previous years.

NATIONAL SCHOLARSHIPS

The Office of Overseas Study increased its assistance and support for national scholarship applicants with impressive results:

Gilman Scholarship: Supported 15 applicants in the fall, yielding 11 awards (73%) and 28 applicants in the spring, yielding 24 awards (86%).

Boren Scholarship: IU supported 8 applicants in 2021, yielding 7 awards (86%).

Freeman Asia Scholarship: IU supported 4 applicants, yielding 2 awards. (50%)

Unfortunately, the scholarship agencies (Department of State and Department of Defense) did not permit the utilization of most of these scholarships as a result of the CDC and Department of State travel advisories due to the pandemic. Only 2 students were able to utilize scholarships while many of the other awardees hope to postpone them to a future date.

Overseas Study staff members are involved in various professional activities on campus and around the world. These opportunities also allow IU to adapt successful approaches to education abroad used elsewhere. Provider organizations often look to IU for advice and collaboration, based on its long-term experiences in areas including program development, financial aid portability and system-wide quality assurance practices.

Kathleen Sideli is in her second six-year term on the board of directors of CIEE (Council on International Educational Exchange), serving on the Executive Committee and as chair of the Audit Committee. She also serves on the advisory board of IU's Center for Global Change and is a longtime member of OVPUE's General Education Committee.

Susan Carty continues to serve as membership chair of NAFSA's Rainbow Special Interest Group. She also serves as Chair of the Campus Review Board for the IU Bloomington Division of Student Affairs.

Laura Kremer serves on the Steering Committee for HEIBO (Higher Education International Business Officers).

Amanda Roshan-Rawaan serves on the Forum on Education Abroad's Working Group on Data and Research.

Samuel Hudson serves on the Steering Committee of the Bloomington Academic Advisors Council at Indiana University. This past year he earned an Intercultural Competence Certificate.

Allie Prieboy earned an Intercultural Competence Certificate.

PROGRESS ON GOALS FOR 2020-21

ALL GOALS WERE ACHIEVED AT SOME LEVEL BUT WILL CONTINUE AS ONGOING GOALS GIVEN THEIR IMPORTANCE.

1. Further expand and diversify study abroad opportunities throughout Asia.

While Asia has been a major area of growth for study abroad in recent years, the current geopolitical situation with China has made it less of a draw for IU students. Growth in Asia has been in other locations such as Hong Kong, Singapore, Indonesia and Thailand.

2. Develop new programs with OVPIA grants, particularly in non-traditional locations and underrepresented disciplines.

There were no development grants distributed in 2020-21 due to IU's pandemic travel restriction for faculty.

3. Expand numbers of students pursuing internships abroad.

In-person internships were on hiatus in 2020-21. Some students took advantage of virtual global internships.

4. Expand the numbers of underrepresented students, particularly those not equally represented from the general campus population, across program.

While the pause in most programming slowed down this effort, staff throughout Indiana University continue to conduct outreach to underserved populations to encourage them to plan to study abroad in the future.

5. Work with all IU schools and campuses to integrate study abroad within the curriculum and to support program development.

Faculty throughout the university in all disciplines are looking forward to taking students abroad again when that becomes more feasible than in 2020-21.



The IU Honors Program in Foreign Languages (IUHPFL) integrates high school students into host families with daily instruction in language, conducting all communications in the host country language and adhering to an honor code for good behavior. The instructors are predominantly from Indiana University where they receive training for their leadership roles in the program for their positions across 11 programs in seven countries.

Unfortunately, the coronavirus pandemic resulted in the cancellation of all IUHPFL programs in the summers of 2020 and 2021. Nevertheless, IUHPFL staff have remained in close contact with program coordinators, program instructors and high school teachers as well as students who deferred their participation. New alumni videos have been shared with program supporters. And the onsite coordinators expressed in the 2020 newsletter how much they missed IUHPFL students due to the pandemic and gave further updates along with local student perspectives in the 2021 newsletter.

IUHPFL continues to collaborate with IUB offices to provide a gateway for program alumni to Indiana University. Overseas Study works in consonance with HPFL to let students know what opportunities await them here at IU—financial, experiential and academic-- through special marketing materials and events. An updated analysis of recent cohorts shows that 1/3 choose to attend an Indiana University campus after high school. And over 60% of the recent HPFL cohorts that graduated from IU studied in over two dozen different countries. This is double the participation rate of the general IU undergraduate population. And a new analysis of HPFL alums at IU showed that they took an average of five foreign language courses each, undertook new less- commonly-taught languages and showed a high density of majors in business, international studies, Spanish and French.
